

► HUES SHADES TINTS



Value (Hue, Shade and Tint): an element of art; the lightness and darkness of a line, shape, or form; a measure of relative lightness and darkness.

- Hues, Shades and Tints refer to a color and variations on a color.
- Hue means the pure color as it would fall on the color wheel.
- Shades are hues with added black.
- Tints are hues added with white.
- If an artist restricts his palette to a color and its tints and hues, then it is called "Monochromatic."

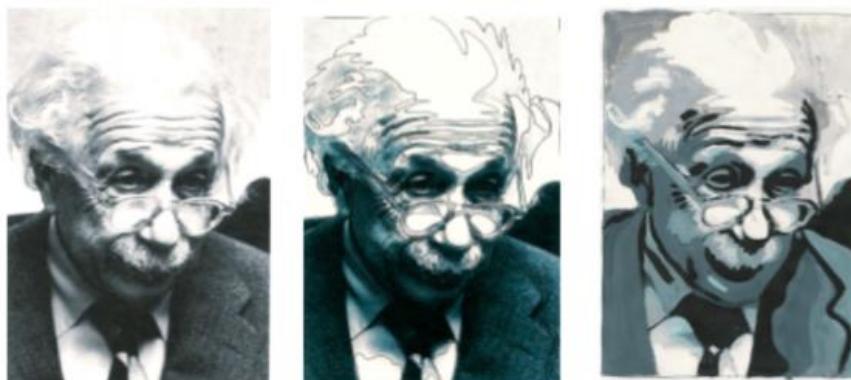

- Make a hue/tint/shade chart or color wheel. Tempera or acrylic paints are much easier than watercolor for this project since they are opaque.
- Use a face from a magazine and copy it into black and white. Divide it into color blocks or into tints or shades. Create a palette by putting a dab of pure color in the middle and pure black on one side and pure white on the other side. By mixing different proportions of black and the color and white and the color, create two or three different shades and two or three different tints. Paint over the face by trying to match which is a hue, tint, shade or pure black or white. (Einstein example below)

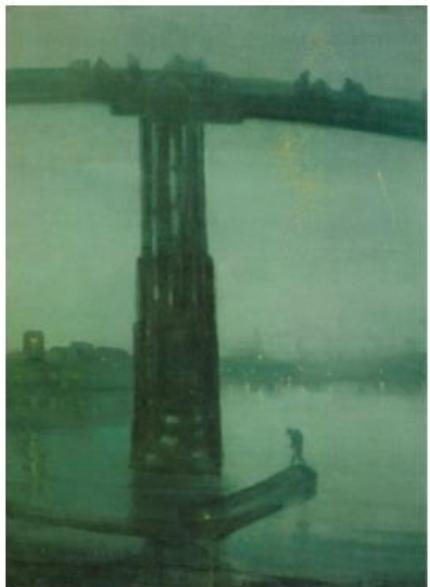
